Until then, I pray that God will be in our midst as we retreat from the busyness of the holiday season to gather, worship, and celebrate the birth of our Savior together. In doing so, we may find small ways to capture the magic so many of us experienced in Montreat.

Traditions

Do you have family traditions at Christmas time? Perhaps it is cooking favorite family recipes, reading holiday stories, matching pajamas, special ornaments and decorations, or singing favorite carols? The dictionary defines the word, traditions, as the <u>transmission of customs or beliefs from generation to generation</u>, <u>or the fact of being passed on in this way.</u> Traditions define and carry us into the future, while remembering the past.

Presbyterian Women's Council is rich in history and traditions. These traditions began in 1884 with the formation of the Ladies' Aid Society by Sarah Lewis Smyre as president, who was the wife of one of the founding elders, Alfred Monroe Smyre. Throughout the years at FPC, the name of this organization underwent several name changes:

- 1887-Ladies' Home and Foreign Mission Society, led by Susan Rhyne Love
- 1905-Ladies Missionary Society, led by Lela Shuford Reid
- 1920-Circle plan was adopted and became the Women's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.
- 1948-The name was changed to Women of the Church (WOC)
- 1983-The name was changed to Presbyterian Women

Over the last one-hundred-forty-one years, the women of FPC have started and continue to carry on the traditions of providing meals for the bereaved, celebrating new babies, contributing towards mission projects with time and money, and recognizing a member each year with the Honorary Life Membership. Presbyterian Women (PW) also honors college students with scholarships, raises money through the annual bake sale, and hosts the annual birthday luncheon. Providing food and hospitality is a long, rich tradition for the PW. In <u>A Christian-Witness History Of The First Presbyterian Church</u> by Marion A. Ellis, the following recipe is included in the Women of the Church section. The author says that this recipe was "used on several occasions to fete new members and those serving as interim pastors."

Crab Shrimp Casserole

Served to welcome minister's family at Sunday lunch given by WOC

1 cup chopped celerySalt and pepper to taste1 green pepper, choppedDash of Worcestershire sauce1 medium onion, chopped½ pound boiled, fresh shrimp

6 Tbsp. butter (divided) 1 (8 oz) package frozen white crab, thawed and rinsed

2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour 1 cup cooked wild rice 1 cup milk 1 cup cooked white rice

1 can cream of mushroom soup 1 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese

Sauté celery, onion, and pepper in 4 tablespoons of the butter. In a saucepan, melt the rest of the butter; add flour gradually and stir until smooth, adding milk a little at a time, and heat until thickened. Stir constantly. Add soup, cheese, salt, pepper, and Worcestershire sauce. Mix with sauteed vegetables. Combine this mixture with crab, shrimp, and rice. Pour into a greased round 2-quart casserole dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

On September 7, our church family gathered for the *Kickoff Dinner*, which launched both our *40 Days of Prayer* and our study of the book The Sailboat Church. On October 19, the Session and Diaconate participated in a *Leadership Summit* that prepared the way for our church-wide online survey. Throughout November, more than 20 small-group listening sessions were held with the help of our consultant, Mark Tidsworth. We are deeply grateful to everyone who took part in any of these Curiosity and Courage offerings.

We are also pleased to share that we have added two additional members—Cindy Clark and Craig Whitley to the Curiosity and Courage Committee. We warmly welcome their thoughtful insight, fresh perspective, and enthusiastic participation as we continue this important work.

So, you may ask, "What's next"?

Over the next two months, the Curiosity and Courage Committee (CCC) will be diving into the feedback and insights gathered so far. Mark Tidsworth will present the themes emerging from the Listening Groups, and we will also receive a detailed report from Holy Cow Consulting, the firm that conducted our online survey. Their analysis will include both overall findings and demographic insights specific to our congregation.


On **January 24, 2026**, the CCC will join members of the Session and the Diaconate for a Leadership Retreat where we will review, discern, and synthesize all data collected to date along with Mark's reflections and guidance. Following that retreat, the CCC will begin drafting our church's Mission, Vision, Values, and a Strategic Plan. These will first be shared with Session members for review, and later presented to the whole congregation.


