

PW Circles: Solving the Mystery

"Women have always had a major impact on significant decisions at First Church. In 1884, the Ladies' Aid Society was formed." — Marion Ellis

"Make new friends, but keep the old—one is silver and the other's gold." That simple song reminds us of what it means to be part of a circle: a group bound together in faith, friendship, and purpose. First Presbyterian Church currently has seven circles and a Women of the Church Council, but just what does this mean?

At First Presbyterian Church, every woman is part of a circle, small groups that meet monthly for Bible study, fellowship, and mission. Some gather during the day, others in the evening; some meet at church, others off-site. For example, our service circle doesn't



hold regular meetings but faithfully supports mission initiatives. There is a circle for everyone.

These circles also provide small group membership within a larger church family.

Personally speaking, my circle has supported my family through happy times and hard times and the everyday in between times. We have raised babies together, rejoiced in children's weddings, and now are welcoming grandchildren together.

Circles are part of a long legacy of women's ministry at FPC, beginning in 1884 with the Ladies' Aid Society, later becoming Women of the Church, and in 1983, Presbyterian Women. The Presbyterian Women's Council (PWC) is our next level of identity for Presbyterian Women. It meets monthly and is made up of leaders who represent the many areas in which women in our church are involved.

Some of the special events (Women of the Church Sunday and the annual bake sale), missions (Black Mountain Home for Children, Guatemala Partnership, Malawi, Circle sponsored projects, church projects, and other outreach opportunities), casserole care (providing meals to church members who have experienced medical challenges, deaths, etc.), bereavement services (organize the meals for members who have suffered loss of loved ones, with the help of circles within the church), historian, scrapbook, new baby nurture, blanket Sunday, scholarship/leadership, and sewing ministry. While the council is made up of elected members to represent these areas, all women are welcome and encouraged to participate in these important areas of our church life.

Through circles and the council, Presbyterian Women nurture faith, build lasting friendships, and serve both the church and community. There is truly a place for every woman to belong. In Realm, when you look under the tab, "Groups", you will find which circle to which you have been assigned.

For ten incredible years, David Jennings has filled the halls of First Presbyterian Church with music that moves the soul and lifts the spirit. As our devoted organist, David brings not only immense musical talent to our worship services, but also a deep faith, a servant's heart, and a wonderfully witty sense of humor that makes him beloved by all who know him.

Week after week, David's music invites us into deeper worship, stirring our hearts, stirring our minds, and reminding us of the beauty and power of God's presence. His leadership has strengthened our musical ministries, enriched our traditional services, and blessed every member of our congregation in ways both profound and personal.

Originally from Belmont and a graduate of Gaston Christian School, David holds degrees in nursing from UNC-Greensboro and UNC-Chapel Hill. When he's not at the organ bench, he's faithfully serving patients as a nurse practitioner in Solid Tumor Oncology at Levine Cancer Institute.





This past year, David had the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to travel to Italy for a private tour of some of the world's most historic pipe organs. Here's what he had to share:

"In January, I was honored to receive an invitation to be part of a small tour of historic pipe organs in Rome, Italy, as well as in Bergamo, a small town near Milan. Some of the cathedrals we visited include:

- The Church of St. John of the Florentines
- The Basilica of St. Mary of the Angels and the Martyrs
- The Archbasilica of St. John Lateran
- The Church of St. Ignatius of Loyola
- The Church of St. Galla

Many of these churches feature pipe organs from the 1800s—some even older, dating to the 1600s—and were played by legends like G.F. Handel. One church was founded in the year 324! While I didn't play for services or recitals, it was still a thrill to sit at these magnificent instruments and experience their sound firsthand."

We are so grateful for the music, joy, and guiet strength David has brought to First Presbyterian Church over the past decade. Thank you, David, for your faithfulness, your artistry, and your heart.

Building More Than Beds: Building Bonds Through Service

Interview with Patti and Tim Scamardo



What inspired you to sign up for the SHP bed build?

I enjoy doing volunteer work, especially when it benefits a child. Selfishly, it makes me feel good and reminds me that while I often feel I don't have any "real" talents, helping others does not necessarily require talents. It requires compassion, looking outside of oneself to do good in the world.

How did you first hear about First Presbyterian's involvement in this project?

I first heard about Sleep in Heavenly Peace in the spring when it was announced during Sunday service and listed in the church bulletin. We had not joined the church at that time, so we were not sure we could volunteer. When the fall opportunity was announced, we were determined to volunteer since we are now members. Kim Witherell shared her previous experience volunteering for Sleep in Heavenly Peace with me, which solidified my determination to play a part in the fall mission. We were unable to assist with the build due to a conflicting commitment; however, we helped relocate the beds from the build site to First Presbyterian Church, Belmont. We also volunteered for delivery day.

What was your favorite moment working alongside other volunteers?

I can't say there was a favorite moment, as the entire delivery day was great in that we had the opportunity to get to know members of our church family better and meet some members for the first time. With that being said, the gathering at Groovy Beast for lunch afterwards may have been my favorite part as we exchanged stories, fun, and laughter.

If you could describe this experience in one word, what would it be? "Inspiring"

How do you see projects like this making a difference in our community?

It provides care and support to those who need help, while showing that there is still good in this turbulent world. It also shows those in need that the church can be a place where they can find love and support instead of judgment. They may decide to attend a church service out of appreciation, but also find God while in his house.

Last year, our parking lot was packed with joy, laughter, and creativity, and we're planning for an even bigger crowd this time around.


So start planning your trunk theme, grab your costumes, and invite your friends, family, and neighbors for a night you won't want to miss.
