2025 Vacation Bible School Recap

While temperatures outside soared into the upper 90's during the week of July 21, the halls of First Presbyterian Church became a cool respite from the heat after being transformed into the snowy landscape of Alaska. From the kickoff of Vacation Bible School on July 20 until the closing program on July 24, the fellowship hall, classrooms, and halls of our church were alive with the sounds of over eighty children as they laughed, sang, learned, and engaged in activities that helped them learn that Jesus is our "True North."

The children were greeted each morning by their adult leaders, youth helpers, and other adult volunteers. To really set the scene for our wilderness adventures, children were divided into animal families based on their age. These groups included Moose, Huskies, Eagles, Caribou, Snowy Owls, Reindeer, Wolves, Grizzly Bears, and Polar Bears. Each day began with songs and dancing all together. Bible points were introduced each morning that helped the children learn that we can always trust Jesus. These points included:

- When we wonder, we can trust Jesus.
- When we feel alone, we can trust Jesus.
- When we feel powerless, we can trust Jesus.
- When we need hope, we can trust Jesus.

VBS participants heard each morning from Mission's Committee members. The children were the hands and feet of Jesus as they brought in paper products, cleaning products, and non-perishable food to support the FPC Christmas in July mission project. They also raised almost \$400.00 in monetary donations.

After opening activities, each morning, our herds, flocks, and packs were off to learn more as they participated in Wild Bible Adventures where our daily Bible story was brought to life, Sticky Scriptures where they began to learn to memorize the daily Bible verse, Imagination Station where they engaged in hands-on science activities, and Glacier Games where they participated in games and challenges that revolved around the daily Bible point. A mid-morning snack brought all groups back together as they heard from Ponder the Otter, Clawdia the Crab, Kody the Bear, and Earnest the Eagle, who helped them better understand the Bible point.

To spend time with these children and other volunteers was truly a gift. Learning to sing and dance with abandonment and to laugh those deep belly laughs as we learned to trust in Jesus was a blessing beyond measure. Each adult volunteer left at the end of VBS, hoping and praying that this fire for Jesus will burn strong in these children and each of us, for the rest of our lives, and that we will never forget to trust in Jesus!
