

Are You Ready for Renewal?

This month, our congregation will do its part in the Curiosity and Courage initiative by sharing what God has done and is doing at First Presbyterian Church, Gastonia. After a time of discernment through 40 days of collective prayer and study of the Sailboat Church book, participating in an online survey, and listening groups, we will have had a chance to speak about what God is saying to us individually and as a congregation. I thank God for the collective wisdom of our members and leaders, as well as the expertise the Curiosity and Courage Committee has enlisted to help us discern a focused vision amidst a wide range of input.

In some ways, this month's efforts mark the fruition of years of discernment and prayer. That discernment began when I first arrived at FPC Gastonia and prayed for God to provide us with a clear sense of identity, purpose, and direction in a community experiencing rapid change. That discernment continued in the fall of 2024 when I asked the incoming Chairs on Session to join me in prayer for what God has in store for us. Together, our collective discernment continued in January of this year when the Session met as a whole and commissioned the Curiosity and Courage Committee to lead and develop a discernment process in which the entire congregation could participate. After a spring and summer of vigorous planning and an exciting kickoff in September, we find ourselves at the moment when we are ready to bring our voices together. What an exciting conclusion to a prayer that began years ago!

As much as this month presents opportunities to find answers to prayers given long ago, it will also mark the beginning of a season of pursuing God in new ways. Through our collective prayers and input, we will begin to discern who God is calling us to be and where God is leading us in 2025, 2026, and beyond. Even though I have no idea where those prayers and input will take us, I have faith in our congregation to listen, plan, form, and move in the direction the Spirit is leading us. Moreso, I have faith in the Holy Spirit, who will faithfully lead us where we need to follow.

This is what it means to be renewed! No matter who we are, where we are, or when we are, we worship a God who continues to lead us forward. As we discern that path together, I ask that we remain in fervent prayer with a hope only found in Jesus Christ and make bold steps to follow God's Spirit.



Pipes, Pride, and Presbyterian Tradition

Each November, First Presbyterian Church gathers to celebrate one of its most meaningful traditions — the Kirkin' O' the Tartans, a worship service rich with history, symbolism, and joy. This cherished observance began at First Presbyterian in 1992, when Noel Johnson of the Gunn Clan helped introduce the Kirkin' tradition to our congregation. That first year, tartans representing families such as Lauder, Wilson, Guthrie, McGregor, MacQueen, Montgomery, MacDougal, Robertson, and others were presented and blessed.

Over the years, our celebration has continued to grow, embracing additional clans including Stewart, Blair, Keith, Campbell, MacDonald, Cunningham, Armstrong, Rose, Gordon, Sinclair, MacLean, Wallace, Carmichael, Anderson, MacArthur, Craig, Rankin, Love, Moffat, MacLaren (Boy Scouts), and even Montreat, reflecting the deep roots and wideranging heritage within our church family. Last year, we proudly added our 80th and 81st tartans — Hamilton and Duncan to this colorful display of faith and ancestry.

The first Kirkin' sermon at First Presbyterian was preached by Rev. John DeBevoise, who returned again in 1994 and 2004. In 2001, the pulpit was filled by Dr. Tom Long, then recognized by TIME magazine as one of America's ten best preachers. The Kirkin' has also served as a homecoming occasion, featuring a heartfelt message in 2002 from our beloved Dr. Jim Stuart.

For many years, Noel Johnson served as Beadle, carrying the Bible into the sanctuary and calling the congregation to rise. That meaningful role has since been faithfully continued by Luther Blair, who will once again open this year's service with the traditional charge.

We are honored this year to welcome **Rev. Matt Conner**, **pastor of Newell Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, as our guest preacher.** Rev. Conner's connection to First Presbyterian runs deep. He is the son of Josie and David Conner and was born into our church family.

We invite you to join us for this year's **Kirkin' O' the Tartans, Sunday, November 9 at 11 am**, a joyful morning filled with bagpipes, drums, color, and community. Together we give thanks for the faith, family, and enduring legacy of our Scottish Presbyterian heritage. **Everyone is invited to the Kirkin' covered dish luncheon at noon in the Fellowship Hall.**

On November 23, we also honor the spirit of growth in our annual giving:


- Celebrate those pledging for the first time.
