## A TRIBUTE TO JOHN STANLEY from Rev. Lauren Sease Vanacore

I met John in July 2011, a month before I came to Gastonia to serve as associate pastor of First Presbyterian Church. Over lunch, as we did all of the get-to-know-you stuff, I was immediately drawn into John's enthusiasm, his natural curiosity and his obvious concern for people navigating fragile circumstances. We "clicked" from the get-go.

When I arrived a month later to begin my new call among you, John and I were "flying solo" for the first two weeks I was on staff since Dr. Frye and Nisie were traveling to celebrate their wedding anniversary. This is all to say, after those first two weeks of getting settled and John showing me around town,

helping me secure clergy badges for every hospital in two counties, and taking me all sorts of places to introduce me to church members, I knew that, in the words of Humphrey Bogart, "this was the beginning of a beautiful friendship."

Indeed, it has been a beautiful friendship. John has been my cheerleader, my partner in crime, my ride-or-die companion, my confidante, and my tell-me-like-it-is buddy. He pours out his care and concern for me and my family in full measure, just as he does the members of the congregation. He also holds



me accountable and speaks hard truths to me in a loving way when I need to hear it (which is regularly!) Everyone deserves a friend like John. I hope I have been as much of a friend and a colleague to him as he has been to me.

John and I have been through more together than I think either of us could have ever anticipated when I arrived a decade ago! What I hope the congregation knows as we prepare to say goodbye to John and Rose, is that the behind-the-scenes ministry that John has faithfully executed for the church is something we will never be able to fully comprehend. The bedside prayers he has offered before and after surgeries, the bereaved families he has guided and comforted, the middle-of-the-night phone calls he has answered have each been their own isolated event, but when added up over many years they have made for a ministry of compassion that has sustained innumerable souls over many years.

John and Rose joined First Presbyterian Church in 1972 when they moved to Gastonia with their daughter, Susan. They have both been involved in the life and ministry of the church in a variety of ways through their membership at FPC in the past 50 years. When Susan died in a car accident in 1984 at the age of 16, John and Rose discovered Compassionate Friends, a national support group for bereaved parents. They established a chapter at First Presbyterian Church in the late-1980s that still thrives today, caring for grieving parents and maintaining the legacy of their children.

John has been a passionate educator, teaching any class that has asked him. In fact, it was when teaching the Henderlite class in the late 1990s when he first felt a nudge from the Holy Spirit that maybe he could learn additional teaching skills. He enrolled in the Presbytery of Western North



Carolina's School of the Laity program simply to learn how to be a better Sunday School teacher. He had no intention of retiring from his "real job" with PSNC and pursuing ministry full-time. Little did he know God's plan for him was so much more!

After graduating from the School of the Laity, John did, in fact, retire from PSNC and was commissioned to serve as a lay pastor at Robinson Memorial Presbyterian Church, which at the time was experiencing steady decline. When John and Rose began their ministry with the good folks at Robinson, the church had a rebirth and has remained active and vibrant to this day. John would say it was all God's handiwork and that he had nothing to do with it; but, when

God sends a good shepherd and an enthusiastic cheerleader to a congregation, rebirth and renewal are inevitable.

Over the last two decades, John's ministry has included serving as Chaplain for McLean Funeral Directors and as Chaplain of Oasis Shiners, in addition to full-time ministry at Robinson and as part-time Minister of Visitation at First Presbyterian. Finally, in 2016, John became full-time at First Presbyterian and was able to devote his ministry to our congregation.

Even as John has comforted so many, instructed us about grief and how we can console the bereaved, taught hundreds of classes and guided us through conversations about revitalization, don't be mistaken: John knows how to laugh and how to have a good time. He appreciates a good joke, he loves a friendly prank and he brings joy into the rooms he enters! One of the things I will miss is when John walks into Sherry Moore's office and begins serenading her to the 1960s tune, "Sherry," first crooned by Frankie Valli. John brings the fun, along with a lot of laughter and pep!

After an 11:00 worship service one Sunday, someone came up to John and me and asked, "What were you two giggling about up there during the offertory?!" John and I looked at each other and just winked and said, "We'll never tell!" Everyone needs a friend where the wink of an eye tells the story of a thousand inside jokes and tales of having been through more than a few things together. I am grateful to have more than a thousand of these moments with John.

The reality is that there have been many weeks over the last ten years where I have spent more time with John than I have with Jeff or our boys. (Thankfully our spouses are deeply understanding people.) Over the years, John and I have created a friendship and a bond that is as deep as it is

wide. I pray that everyone has a friend like John.

As John and Rose prepare to depart to move to Scotia Village in Laurinburg later this fall, my prayer will always be that they receive as much joy, as much compassion and as much interest in their lives as they have shown others over the many years they have devoted to the worship, mission, ministry and fellowship of First Presbyterian Church and throughout Gastonia. To be clear, I couldn't be more delighted for John and Rose. They deserve every happiness in the world as they transition into the next chapter God has planned for them. But, I'm still really sad to see them go. There will be a void in my daily life for a long while, which I know God will ease with time and new colleagues to get to know, but there will never in my lifetime be another John Stanley with whom to share the joys and the sorrows of ministry. He will forever be my ride-or-die friend.

Please join Pastor Dan, the Session and me in wishing John and Rose well on their last Sunday among us, Reformation Day, October 31. We will celebrate John's ministry during one worship service at 10:00 a.m., followed by a reception in John and Rose's honor immediately following worship at 11:00 a.m.

In the future, if anyone sees me giggling to myself during the offertory, I'll probably be reminiscing about one of our inside jokes. Don't mind me, I'll just be giving thanks for the memories of sharing that sacred space of worship and laughter with John.

Thanks for the memories, John. Don't be a stranger, my dear friend. We'll have Oreos and a glass of Chardonnay soon!



I am so happy that he and Rose will enjoy the retirement they have earned, but I will miss him! We all will. Although I am confident that God is leading someone else to continue the many ministries John has led during his time here, no one will ever replace him.

Thank you, John, for the many ways you have been a blessing to this congregation and to me, personally! I can't wait to see what God has in store for you, next.

## Chrismon Workshop

First Presbyterian Church is embarking on a project to enhance our worship experience with the use of hand-crafted Chrismons. These beautiful ornaments will be used on wreaths, garlands, or trees during the Advent season.

“Chrismon” is a combination of the words “Christ” and “monogram,” and means “symbols of Christ.” Chrismons are gold and white, representing majesty and purity. Ideas for fashioning them are developed from early Christian symbols, the Bible, and church histories.

But we need your help. Over a period of several weeks, we will offer small classes to teach this art and move us forward towards our goal to make about 100 ornaments this year. 78% of patients who have been hospitalized, needed a ventilator, or died from COVID are either overweight (27.8%) or obese (50.2%).


